
The Barngarla language is very different from English.

For example, Barngarla has many pronouns, even a *matrilineal* and *patrilineal* distinction in the *dual*.

For example, the *matri*lineal ergative first person dual pronoun *ngadlaga* (we two) would be used by a *mother* and her child, or by a man and his *sister's* child.

On the other hand, the *patri*lineal form *ngarrrinyi* (we two) would be used by a *father* and his child, or by a woman with her *brother's* child.





While English has only singular and plural, Barngarla has singular, dual, plural and superplural.

For example:

- * An emu is *warraidya*.
- * Two emus are *warraidyalbili*.
- * Emus are *warraidyarri*.
- * Heaps of emus are *warraidyailyarranha*.



UNDERSTANDING BARNGARLA GRAMMAR

What is the ergative?


The *ergative* suffix *-nga* /*-ngi* gets added to a noun to show that that person or thing is doing something to someone or something else. This is why it's called the *doer* as well.

For example, in the sentence 'Gardidingi noonadharrroo yardli.' (The wife pushes her husband), you can see that at the end of gardidi (wife), -ngi has been attached.

This is because in Barngarla, you have to show who or what is doing the action. In this case, it is the wife doing the action of *pushing* to her husband.


